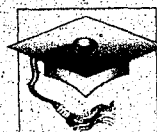

## Posey: Face gun problem

Troubled by weapons and drugs in schools, a departing Wayne-Westland school board member says district officials should plan a summit to discuss the problems with parents and school employees.

As he leaves the board Dec. 31 because of an out-of-state job promo-

tion, Leonard Posey said officials should address the issues — particularly school violence — in a more proactive way.

Saying parents don't know the severity of the problem, Posey said a well-publicized summit could help the community better grasp such issues as school violence, gangs and drugs.

"We've got kids bringing guns and knives to school, and we're not doing anything to teach against weapons," he said.

At least four guns have been confiscated in Wayne-Westland schools since Nov. 9. And, increasingly, youngsters walking the streets of Westland are being robbed at gunpoint of athletic coats that have gang "colors."

Posey said representatives from other school districts could be invited to a summit so that local officials could learn how other communities

## Judges leery of Felan-Brown case

Westland's two district court judges will decide this week if they should disqualify themselves from hearing an assault and battery case involving a Wayne-Westland school board member and a former board member.

At Thursday afternoon's arraignment of Sharon Felan, charged with assaulting board member Patricia Brown at a Nov. 23 board meeting, Judge C. Charles Bokus said from the bench that "there could be a prob-

lem" if he or presiding Judge Gail McKnight heard the case.

"There is a strong possibility that the judges may disqualify themselves," Bokus said. He said he would discuss the problem with McKnight and they would probably decide by Tuesday.

Prosecuting attorney Don Vander-sloot and defense attorney Michael Ostroski said they had no objections to the Westland judges hearing the case. If the judges disqualify themselves, a judge from another court will

be asked to handle the misdemeanor case.

Bokus, who accepted Felan's not-guilty plea, set a \$5,000 personal bond for Felan, and also ordered the defendant to avoid any contact with Brown.

Afterwards, Felan wondered how she would meet that directive in the upcoming school board interviews of herself and others who have applied for a board vacancy. The interviews

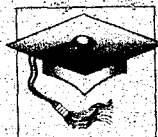

## Stroke survivors learn to help each other cope

In hindsight, Judy Hawk of Livonia says she should have seen a stroke coming — she had a husband suffering from cancer, work concerns and headaches from high blood pressure.

Now, seven weeks after her stroke, the 51-year-old mother of two is coming back strong and is optimistic about returning to a full life.

For stroke survivors, seeing the bigger picture can be an important part of recovery, and seeing others who have made it back from a stroke can be living proof that they can bounce back.

"Seeing former patients come back can show them that there is light at the end of the tunnel," said Gina Massengill, a medical social worker at Botsford General Hospital, Grand River at Eight Mile in

Farmington Hills. "Seeing people who have come back after a stroke lets them know they're not alone and that they can recover."

Since 1988, stroke survivors have been meeting monthly at the hospital's rehabilitation wing with those patients who have had a recent stroke. Experts on stroke and how to cope with its effects are a regular part of the meetings.

But seeing and talking with stroke victims who are back on their feet is a big part of the program.

"I didn't know what I was going to do," said Stan Lipinski, who had a stroke in 1990 at the age of 80. "But I worked with the therapists here. I believe I wouldn't be here walking if it hadn't been for them."

have dealt with problems. He also suggested local assemblies.

"You've got to put the fear of God in kids and parents," he said.

To some extent, the district has tried just that. Routinely, students bringing guns to school have been permanently expelled from the district.

Posey is quitting his board post six months before his elected four-year term expires. He previously had been a board appointee for one year.

An Inkster resident, Posey made history by becoming the first — and only — African-American ever to serve on the seven-member board.

During a recent interview with the Observer, Posey recapped some of the disappointments and positive strides that he has seen during the last four years.

Posey has become frustrated by a community that he said has turned its back on education. In many ways, he said, "it's a dysfunctional community."

Many city and business leaders have failed to involve themselves in a district that has become

splintered, Posey said. The district serves Wayne; most of Westland; and parts of Inkster, Canton Township and Romulus.

Some Canton Township residents are trying to secede from the district, amid hopes of joining the Plymouth-Canton district. In Inkster, many residents don't even know that Wayne-Westland serves part of the city, he said.

The district has improved its public communication in the last year, Posey said, but added that more needs to be done. Citizens in recent years became increasingly cynical about local schools and virtually always rejected tax proposals.

Now, school property taxes have been nearly abolished by state legislators, who spent

months grappling with how to replace the money.

"I think state government has turned its back on education," Posey said.

Among other highlights mentioned by Posey:

■ He has been pleased with Superintendent Larry Thomas' move to place more minorities in administrative positions.

■ He was disappointed that no solid plan preceded a program change in which unruly students were returned to the two high schools from the Cherry Hill Alternative Education Center. He didn't necessarily oppose the decision, but believed it lacked planning.

■ He has been discouraged by sour relations between Thomas' administration and district employee groups, but hopes the situation will improve. Moreover, Posey has become angry at teacher-bashing citizens.

"We have some very, very dedicated teachers," he said, but added that more in-service programs are needed to help the educators.

"They need direction," he said. "They're there, and they care. We need to help them move into the year 2000."

will be held the week of Jan. 10.

Vandersloot asked the judge to prohibit Felan from attending Wayne-Westland school board meetings while she is out on bond, but Bokos felt that was going too far.

His decision concurred with Ostroski's argument that his client "has strong ties to the school board, is active with the board and is a candidate" for the board vacancy and that Felan "has an absolute right to attend board meetings."

Bokos said he will discuss with McKnight whether they should disqualify themselves and that they would decide by Tuesday.

He commented from the bench that there were two problems that concerned him.

One is that the court has had a

long-standing relationship with the school board and school district involving the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program and other activities.

The other is that he read in local newspapers that Brown had contacted city councilwoman Sandra Cicirelli, who is an attorney,

to represent her in the dispute. The council has control over the district court's budget.

Felan was charged with assault and battery after Brown said the former school board member shoved her in a corridor behind the school board meeting room during the Nov. 23 board meeting.

Felan has admitted being in a shouting match with Brown and pointing her finger at Brown, but denied touching her.

Felan was appointed to a board vacancy in July 1992, but lost her bid for election to a full term in June when Brown and Mathew McCusker were elected.

Others were selling pins and T-shirts and holding a spring dance to raise money, having a decorated car in the fall homecoming parade and planning a "whiteout" in the school for one day in which members dress in grim reaper costumes to remind classmates of the consequences of drinking and driving.

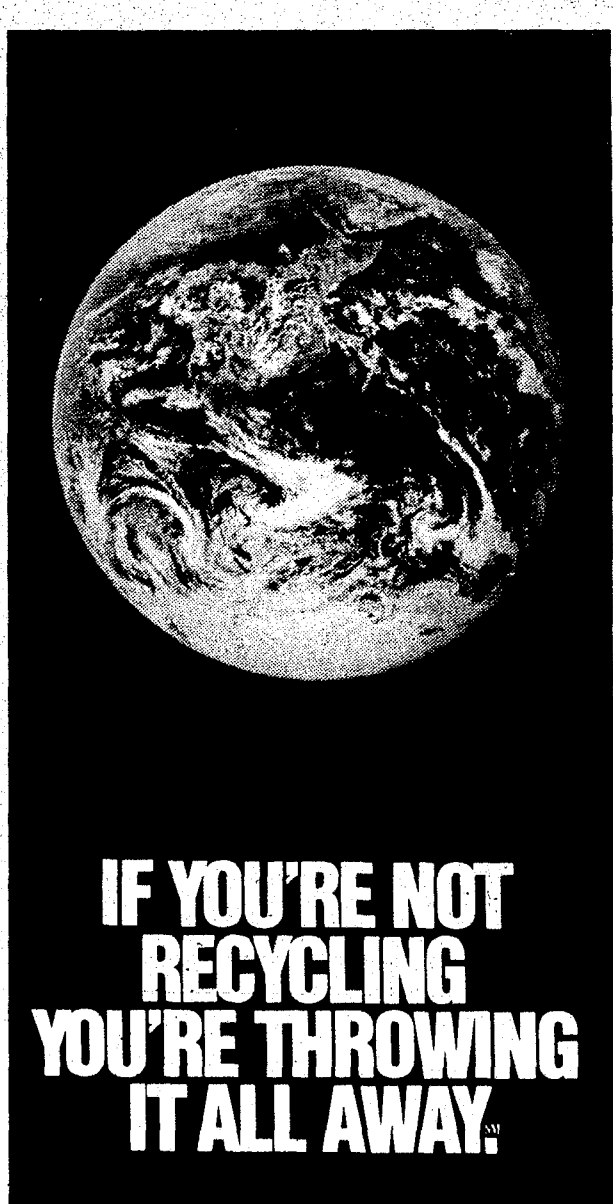

# School tax plans produce change, some wins for all

Michigan voters on March 15 will put the finishing touches on the "biggest change" in school finance in 60 years.

Whether a ballot plan wins or loses, Gov. John Engler won a major victory: State government — not local districts — will pay for public schools.

The Legislature adjourned at midday Christmas Eve after a 26-hour marathon session.

Democrats, who had objected last July to wiping out school property taxes with Senate Bill 1, also won a victory. Schools will have \$10 billion in place, even if voters reject the ballot proposal.

Both political parties win because the bulk of homestead property taxes will be cut.

There was little comfort, however, for Senate conservatives who wanted an overall tax cut. "The issue is going to be what kind of tax you want to pay," said state treasurer Doug Roberts.

Whatever voters say, they are facing the biggest change since the sales tax was approved during the Great Depression and earmarked for schools. Disparities between rich and school districts will be addressed by "raising the floor" to \$4,200 per pupil without "lowering the ceiling" on well-to-do suburban schools.

## PLAN A

Plan A is the Legislature's work and requires no voter approval. Elements:

■ Homestead property taxes will be cut from the current statewide average of 34.5 mills to 12 mills — an average of 65 percent less.

■ The personal income tax rate will rise to 6 percent from the current 4.6 percent. The exemption will rise from \$2,100 per person to \$3,000.

■ The real estate transfer tax rate will rise by 1 percent — from \$1.10 per \$1,000 to \$1.11.

## EDUCATION

per \$1,000 of property price.

■ The cigarette tax will rise 15 cents a pack to 40 cents.

■ The single business tax rate will rise to 2.75 percent from 2.35 percent. SBT essentially is a tax on payroll and any profit.

## PLAN B

Plan B must be put to voters because it involves amending the state constitution (as well as changing some tax laws. Elements:

■ The sales tax is raised to 6 cents from 4 cents per \$1.

■ The homestead property tax is cut to six mills instead of 12 mills.

■ The cigarette tax is hiked 50 cents to 75 cents a pack.

■ The single business tax is kept at the current 2.35 percent instead of being increased.

■ The Lottery is authorized to run a keno game in bars.

## UNCHANGED

Under either plan, businesses and owners of second homes will pay 24 mills in property tax.

That's less than the current average of 34.5 mills. It's more than Gov. Engler's original proposal of 16 mills — and more than the 20 mills proposed by the House bipartisan legislative team (BLT).

Any rate greater than 16 mills is being denounced by business groups such as the Michigan Chamber of Commerce and Small Business Association of Michigan.

The 35 highest spending districts — including many in the Observer & Eccentric area — will receive state aid of \$6,500 per student but will be allowed to ask voters for additional property taxes to restore them to current spend levels in the fiscal year beginning next July 1. Lawmakers call this "harmless" millage.

Early indications are that a handful of districts may see no business property tax cut at all.

The other 537 school districts will be allowed to ask voters for three mills of additional property taxes. Engler is unhappy about this provision. "School boards should concentrate on education, not millage campaigns," he said repeatedly. But school boards, with their long tradition of local control, insisted on some local option.

Engler will campaign for the March 15 ballot plan because it lowers — instead of raising — the personal income tax. Engler and conservatives consider the income tax "anti-growth."

Sen. Mat Dunaskiss, R-Lake Orion, still displays on his desk a 1983 paper with the headline: "Mastin Recalled." Democrat Phil Mastin represented the northern Oakland district until he voted for Gov. James Blanchard's 1.75 percent hike in the income tax rate. Mastin's old district is largely Dunaskiss' new one.

Democrats will be inclined to oppose the ballot plan. They consider the sales tax regressive for low-income people.

Democrats will have mixed feelings, however, because defeating the ballot plan will raise homestead property tax rates from six mills to 12. Senate Democrats, including George Hart of Dearborn, wanted to zero out property taxes on homes.

Engler won a victory when the Legislature kept a watered down version of his "charter schools" plan. Public educational institutions (local school boards, community colleges and state universities) will be able to issue charters.

The Michigan Education Association won two victories: "Schools of choice" are out, and a state mandated "core curriculum" is in.

# Holiday light show still open

The Wayne County Parks System's "Festival of Lights," which has attracted thousands of viewers so far, is open for business through Jan. 9.

The four-mile-long light show along Edward Hines Drive features gigantic displays of animated snowmen, a north pole village, larger-than-life skiers and ice skaters, a Loch Ness monster and lots of other lighted displays.

The show is a fund-raiser for the parks department. A \$5 donation is asked per car.

Participants can view the show by driving down Hines Drive from the intersection of Hines and

Merriman to Outer Drive or Warren Avenue.

The hours of operation are 7-10 p.m. seven days a week, weather permitting. For the shortest wait, see the show Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday. Parks director Hurley Coleman says the wait on those days is 15-35 minutes. On Friday, Saturday, and Sunday the wait is longer. Some people have waited more than 90 minutes on weekends. Cars may approach the intersection of Hines and Merriman from any direction except through Hines Park.

Commuters who use Hines to get to and from work should note

that the road will be closed to regular traffic from 6:30 to about 10:30 p.m.

At the end of the line, light-show patrons may park and shop for souvenirs in the gift shop at the Warrendale picnic area.

The cost of all these holiday lights, which come from Bronner's in Frankenmuth, comes to \$250,000.

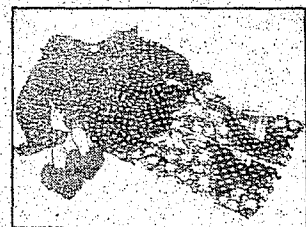

Cargo Express, a wholly owned subsidiary of Fabri-Centers of America Inc. (known locally as Jo-Ann Fabrics) is closing and taking advantage of the holiday shopping season to liquidate its stock at 10-percent off.

Fifteen Cargo Express stores are in metro-Detroit selling housewares at discount prices. As word of the liquidation sale spreads, lines at the cash registers lengthen. The company hopes to be sold out in six to 12 weeks.

"The news came as a total shock to me," said an employee of the Rochester Hills store in Hampton Village Center. "We were called to a meeting last week and the layoffs were announced."

The same thing happened at the Westland store, where one angry employee said she would've been long gone if she knew what was coming. "The news of the closing caught us completely off guard," she said, refusing to identify herself. "We all feel very badly. We won't have jobs in the new year."

But retail observers said they were not surprised by the closings.

"If you noticed the merchandise

quality and stock levels lately, both have been low," said Joe Tyree, manager of Summit Place in Waterford, where one of the larger Cargo Express stores is in liquidation. "We're actively pursuing two new tenants. That store occupied good space in the mall."

Fred Marx, retail and marketing analyst based in Farmington Hills, said the store closings could be blamed on Cargo Express' hodgepodge of locations and a merchandise mix that never "stood out."

"The whole idea was poorly conceived and executed," he said. "There are much better players in the homeworld category. Just look at what Pier One, Crate & Barrel, Heslops, Target and the department stores are doing in housewares these days. They have better sales and a higher quality of merchandise than Cargo Express. Why would anyone shop at a second-tier retailer like Cargo Express when the competition was more aggressive, and frankly, more appealing."

### Leaving a void

But not everyone felt that way.

## Coffee Beanery chief brews a pot of success

In 1976, Joanne Shaw, president and founder of The Coffee Beanery Ltd., parlayed an idea, a \$90,000 bank loan and all the energy she could muster into a gourmet coffee shop at the then new Fairlane Town Center in Dearborn.

Today, she oversees 110 such specialty stores with 700 employees in 30 states. Profits in 1992 totaled \$42 million.

The Fenton-based Shaw was named Michigan Entrepreneur of the Year in 1991.

In remarks to the Women's Economic Club at the Plaza Hotel in Southfield, Shaw told the crowd how it all came about.

"I'm a good visionary," the Flint native said. "I started a specialty coffee business in 1976 when the American consumer was buying highly advertised freeze-dried coffee. There were no coffee beans on the grocery shelves."

"But I had a passion, I loved coffee and like a missionary, I wanted everyone to love it as much as me. The flavor and aroma of a fresh-brewed cup of coffee is such a personal treat. If you have a passion about what you do, that's one key to success."

With her partner, husband Julius, Shaw set about acquiring coffee beans that the company could flavor. They also developed a technique for operating and opening stores.

A second Coffee Beanery opened at Twelve Oaks in Novi a year after the first. Within nine years, the Shaws would have eight corporate stores. Next came a franchising plan.

"It's like we're married. We do not sell stores, we grant licenses. A person who wants to run a Coffee Beanery buys assets and a license to do so. They get our name and business systems. We share feedback and information. What's right for one location may not be right for another."

These days, it takes \$60,000 to \$400,000 to open a Coffee Beanery, depending on the location. Franchisees need to come up with 30 percent in cash, according to Shaw.

At The Coffee Beanery, Shaw and company find locations, secure funding, build stores, then run them until

they find franchisees.

The Coffee Beanery maintains 20-percent corporate-run stores to stay in touch with the daily business and use the stores as regional training centers. They have a vehicle for tak-

When the Cargo Express in downtown Farmington closes in the next few weeks, it will be "sorely missed," according to Judy Downey, Farmington Downtown Development Authority director.

"I'm always sad to hear someone is going out of business," she said. "But I'm particularly sad at the Cargo Express closing. They had such a variety of merchandise, reasonably priced. They were a good customer draw. It's a big loss."

Downey said she'll turn her energies to finding a new tenant for the city as soon as possible. She said she would like to see a bridal salon, a menswear store or a year-round holiday shop open for trade.

Farmington residents Gene and Gary Phillips said the store closing was a shame.

"Gee, I'm going to miss Cargo Express," Gene said. "I liked to walk up here once a week and look around at what was new. It was always a fun store — the merchandise was for holidays and parties. I associated the store with good times."

Gary agreed. "We liked to shop here," he said. "We're quite surprised that it's closing. It always seemed to be doing good business."

"Seemed" is the right word, according to Marx. "The company did a lot of wheel spinning with bright booklets and lots of merchandise but the sales figures just weren't there," he said.

Alan Roszkamm, Fabri-Centers' chairman, said the company had been trying to sell the 41-store Cargo Express division for the past several months. Cargo

Express stores are in Michigan, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

"We have retained a liquidation consultant to close and liquidate all our Cargo Express stores," he said in a press release announcing the decision. "The company expects to generate positive cash flow from this liquidation. It is important to get this chapter of our business behind us so that we can focus our entire energies on improving the company's core fabric retailing operation."

Robert Norton, vice chairman of Fabri-Centers, blamed the closings on "fierce competition," stating the loss of jobs to 100 full-time and 500 part-time employees nationwide was a hard pill to swallow for the company.

"We feel badly," he said in a phone interview from his Hudson,

Ohio, office. "We tried to sell the business for a year. We're aware that we had many loyal customers. My wife won't even talk to me when I come home. She's shopped there for years and is very upset by the decision to close."

"When Cargo Express is gone, we will focus on our core business, JoAnne Fabrics. We've been closing our smaller JoAnne Fabrics stores in the malls and opening bigger stores elsewhere. We have a core clientele of crafters and hobbyists and we want to be the best we can be for them."

The Great American Asset Management/Hilco Trading Co. is managing the liquidation. A spokesman said he hoped the inventory liquidation would be speeded along by shoppers looking for holiday bargains.

ing locations back from franchisees. Shaw now sits on the International Franchises Association board of directors.

George Serra, a franchisee with three Coffee Beanery shops, speaks highly of his owner-franchisee relationship with Shaw. He owns the Lakeside store in Sterling Heights, the new Coffee Beanery espresso cart in the same mall, and a Coffee Beanery at Southland Mall in Taylor.

"I enjoy the relationship with Joanne and Julius," he said. "I feel part of a big family. They are

instrumental in creating this feeling because they call and keep in touch. They want to know how things are going. This makes me feel very good."

Will the Coffee Beanery go public soon? "We need to continue to get better," Shaw said. "We're talking about it. But it's really not on the drawing board yet."

#### Strategic plans

Along the way, The Coffee Beanery had to make some tough strategic decisions to ensure growth.

"In 1988, we hired a visual consultant," Shaw said. "If we were a gourmet coffee store, why did we look like a mug shop? Our goal was to make our stores look like a fine jewelry store. With brass, black marble and light oak, we achieved a new look and the mall gods, as I call them, were thrilled. This helped us get better mall positions."

Most of The Coffee Beanerys are in shopping malls. Freestanding espresso kiosks have been added to their lineup, along with a menu of specialty drinks to

please non-coffee drinkers. In New York City and Georgetown in Washington, D.C., Coffee Beanerys have seating, sandwiches and salads.

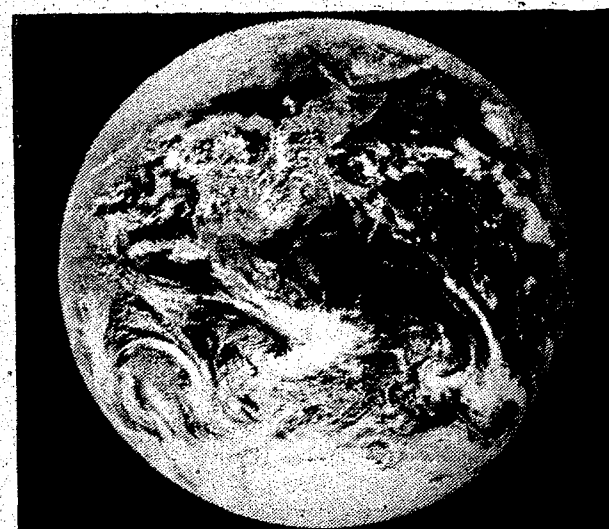
"We want to be everywhere because ours is an impulse sale," Shaw said. "We're moving onto college campuses, and office buildings like Wayne State University and the Fisher Building in Detroit."

The Coffee Beanery also is coming out with a catalog to tap into the mail order business.

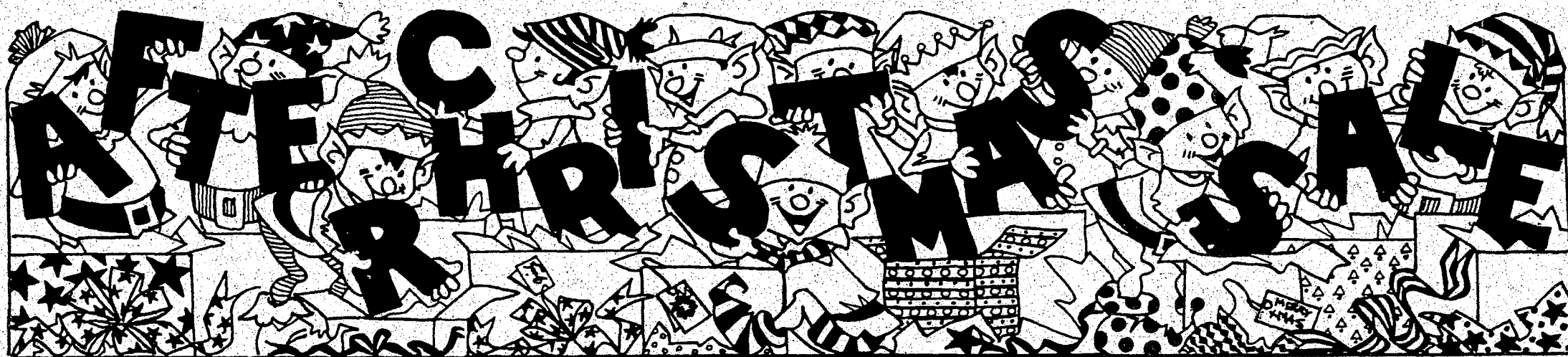

# Carlin deserves support for being a fighter

I noted some very surprised faces when I walked into a fancy fundraiser at the River Crest Club in Rochester Hills and plunked down my check to help defray the cost of the legal fees for the defense of Gerard Carlin.

Gerard Carlin is the ex-Oakland County Sheriff's captain who had commanded the Rochester Hills post until Sheriff John Nichols demoted him to jail sergeant. That demotion came after charges surfaced that he accepted illegal overtime fees and ordered on-duty subordinates to chauffeur L. Brooks Patterson around when he was a candidate for the post of county executive — which position Patterson later won.

The one-time heir-apparent to the sheriff's seat, Carlin now faces criminal prosecution regarding these and other allegations.

He is the same Gerard Carlin who four years earlier had joined other governmental and municipal officials in

publicly denouncing me for my Joycelyn Elders-like support for the legalization of drugs. This blistering barrage of denunciation had come at a time when I was in danger of losing both my job and my pension because of stances I had taken on this and other issues involving multicultural curricula and minority recruitment when I was assistant superintendent of Rochester Schools.

He is also the same Gerard Carlin with whom I had repeatedly clashed over our opposing ideologies regarding whether the schools' Police Liaison Department should operate as essentially a preventive (my view) or a regulatory entity (his).

The duties of our Police Liaison Department, which consisted of two sheriff's deputies and two Rochester City policemen reporting directly to me, were defined by me and a municipal-scholastic-civil committee which I chaired. I was the sole evaluator of

these police officers' performances. The department, in carrying out its

charges as outlined for it by the division of instruction (which I headed), had consistently won awards and drawn countywide praise for its beneficial service to our 11,000 students.

Despite this, Carlin persistently demanded that the officers be lined up for uniformed, shined-shoe inspection every morning and subjected to other militaristic treatment (from which I breezily exempted them in light of the student-supportive, guiding, exemplary roles I expected them to play).

Thus, it would have been difficult to find two more political, philosophical and stylistic opposites than me and this young spit-and-polish command officer who was 20 years my junior. And thus was the surprise which my presence produced among observers at his River Crest fund-raiser.

Still, even when Carlin and I clashed, I respected and actually admired him despite myself, because in a certain sense I saw a kindred spirit.

And this wasn't because we both have Scottish surnames, or because he had once policed the Detroit neighborhood where I grew up. It was because Gerard Carlin was — and is — a fighter. His present accusers are about to discover this, to their sorrow.

For the record, I happen to believe that Carlin, who appears to have been set up to take the fall for higher-ups, is innocent — or thinks he is innocent.

But that isn't the main reason why I contributed to his defense. The main reason why I contributed to his defense is because I know what it feels like to be pre-tried and pre-convicted in and by the press, and this is what is happening to Gerard Carlin now.

# Financial planners are helpful, but be careful

The Clinton Administration's new tax law, the Revenue Recovery Act of 1993, promises to pose neat challenges for taxpayers in Metro Detroit and across the nation. This law eliminates deductions available in previous years. Many of us are about to find ourselves in new brackets with bigger tax bills. Some folks are taking action now. They are seeking financial strategies that can be put to work before the end of the year.

Finding the right resource, however, isn't as easy as it seems, particularly when it comes to personal finances. While accountants are equipped to manage taxes and the legal accounting of assets and liabilities, most are not attuned to the broad range of investment opportunities that can be used to reduce taxable income. The same can be said for other specialists in the financial field: insurance brokers, trust officers, attorneys and stock brokers.

In recent years, the profession of fi-

nancial planning has evolved and moved in to fill this gap. These professionals design an overall plan which includes a monthly budget as well as long-range strategies to help increase a client's net worth. Planners typically offer clients a variety of options designed to suit the client's pocketbook and objectives. Some planners serve only as consultants, while others are structured to offer these services in-house.

Financial planners sound like the answer to our prayers — and some of them are. The problem is that, because this is a relatively new profession, no uniform list of prerequisites exists. Financial planners in Michigan are not required to meet a single set of educational standards, pass an accreditation exam, obtain a license from a governmental regulatory agency or even have prior experience in the discipline. Virtually anyone can hang out a shingle or place an advertisement in the telephone

directory and be called a financial planner.

The Better Business Bureau received a call recently from a Livonia man who hired a financial planner, expecting to get a long range investment plan. What he actually received was a document that simply listed his income and monthly expenses. He considered this a poor return for his investment.

Be on the lookout for so-called financial planners who are actually sales persons in disguise. Some planners benefit financially by selling a specific product (e.g. insurance policy). Planners who offer options as well as recommendations are more likely to be operating in your best interest.

Planners who operate with a post office box or telephone answering service, and those with no staff can pick up and move quickly, leaving behind a trail of bad advice, failed or fraudulent investments. As a protective measure, visit

their office and make certain he or she has established ties to reputable accountants, attorneys and other professionals.

So how do you select a qualified professional? One option is to look for five designations: Certified Financial Planner (CFP), Chartered Financial Consultant (ChFC), Master of Science in Financial Services (MSFS), Registry of Financial Planning Practitioners or Registered Financial Planners (RFP).

Before hiring a financial planner, ask him or her to provide references and show you examples of the reports provided for clients similar to you. Find out if you will be dealing with this individual directly or an associate.

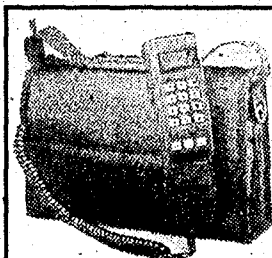

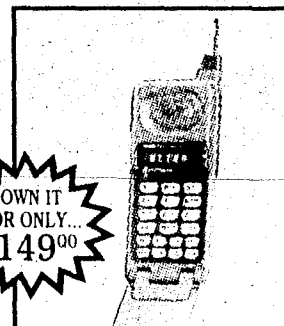
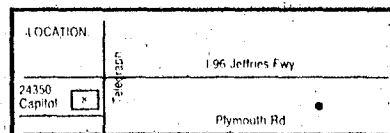

## Determined to come back

Lipinski, who lives in Detroit, was determined to come back, even at an advanced age, from stroke.

"I told someone (shortly after the stroke) that I was going to my grandson's wedding in Albuquerque and that I was going to dance with the bride. And I did."

Stroke survivors usually spend two to six weeks in the rehab unit, which also takes in amputees, orthopedic patients and patients with other neurological disorders who need the intensive rehabilitation, said unit manager Dahlia Klein. "We try to make everyone able to be as independent as possible."

And although most stroke survivors are older, there have been patients in their 30s admitted after a stroke, Klein said.

For Hawk, who still uses a wheelchair but has regained almost total function, the age stereotype helped fool her into not being more careful.

"I associated stroke with older people," said the Livonia resident. "But a lot of my problem was needless worry. Friends from work have visited me and talked about what's going on at work. That's when I realized that I was worrying about things that

weren't that important."

## Rehab staff praised

Like Lipinski before her, Hawk is making great gains and has nothing but praise for the rehab staff.

"They're upbeat. They're more like friends than nurses."

George Kippola said he was happy as an electrician at the Ford Motor plant in Livonia when he suffered a stroke in 1988 at age 62.

"I liked my job. I didn't feel stressed. But it happened right on the job. I had a cerebral hemorrhage. There was no indication of trouble. I just heard a snap and fell."

Like others who've gone from an active life to seemingly complete helplessness and frustration, Kippola was worried about his future.

"I wondered if I'd ever walk again. But I was determined to

walk out of here. I decided that vegetables are for salads. Six weeks later I walked out of here. When I had come here, I had no feeling over my whole left side."

Klein said the philosophy of the rehab unit is the emphasis on leaving the unit and becoming more independent, even if the patient goes to an assisted living arrangement, such as a nursing home.

"We emphasize wellness instead of sickness. The patients wear clothes and receive their visitors in here (dining area). Otherwise it's like having someone visit you in your bedroom."

Betty Zimmerman, a retired music therapist who volunteers her talents to Botsford and to the Stroke Club, said she has been amazed at the progress patients make in the unit.

"I'll see them one week and they will say that they don't think they're progressing. I'll come in a week later and ask them if they remember how they were doing a week ago."

At their Christmas party last week, members of the Stroke Club raised their glasses of punch (dietetic) and sang Christmas carols with the knowledge that they'll enjoy many happy returns of the day.

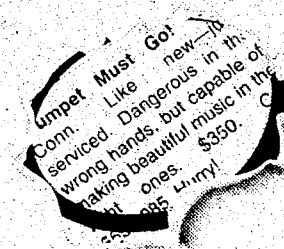

# Most area reps support S&L bailout bill

**Here's how Observer & Eccentric-area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending Nov. 26**

## HOUSE

**S&L Bailout:** By a vote of 235 for and 191 against, the House approved the conference report on a bill (S 714) releasing \$18.3 billion that is expected to complete the savings-and-loan bailout. The bill was sent to the White House.

Congress has now appropriated about \$105 billion since 1989 to pay off depositors at more than 700 bankrupt S&Ls. Uncovered by pay-as-you-go budget rules, the money has come from Treasury borrowing. Congress also has authorized the Resolution Trust Corp. to borrow more than \$100 billion in working capital that is to be repaid through the sale of seized assets.

A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Bob Carr, D-Pontiac, Dale Kildee, D-Flint, Sander Levin, D-Southfield, William Ford, D-Ypsilanti. **Voting no:** Joseph Knollenberg, R-Birmingham.

**Spending Restraint:** By a vote of 272 for and 163 against, the House passed a bill (HR 3400) to slow the growth of federal spending by \$37.1 billion over five years through fiscal 1998. Drafted by the administration and House Democratic leaders, the bill is President Clinton's promised sequel to the \$500 billion, five-year deficit-reduction measure approved by Congress in August. It saves \$32.5 billion by eliminating 252,000 federal jobs, \$2.7 billion by increasing government efficiency and \$1.9 billion

by rescinding already appropriated funds. The bill differs structurally from the Penny-Kasich alternative (below) in that it does not lower spending ceilings previously set by Congress. Thus it does not "lock in" its savings.

A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Bob Carr, Dale Kildee, Sander Levin and William Ford. **Voting no:** Joseph Knollenberg.

**To Reject Penny-Kasich:** By a vote of 213 for and 219 against, the House rejected an alternative to HR 3400 (above) that sought more than twice as much in deficit reduction. This plan by Reps. Timothy Penny, D-Minn., and John Kasich, R-Ohio, also differed from the underlying bill by requiring all of the savings to go to lowering the deficit.

It sought to curb federal red ink by \$90.4 billion over five years, with nearly half the savings achieved by slowing entitlement programs, mainly Medicare. It sought discretionary cuts of \$52.5 billion in scores of areas from merging agencies into more efficient units to cutting the legislative branch budget. Penny-Kasich eliminated 252,000 civil service slots as did the underlying bill, but also curbed federal military and civilian retirement benefits.

Opponent John Dingell, D-Mich., said: "We in Congress are sent here to make sound decisions for

our constituents. . . It is easy to vote for unsound budget cuts. It is infinitely more difficult to craft and vote for sound ones that make sense and will work. Vote against this outrageous, misguided, irrational, unworkable, pathetic attempt to craft public policy."

A yes vote was to enact the Penny-Kasich deficit-reduction plan. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Knollenberg. **Voting no:** Carr, Kildee, Levin and Ford.

**Campaign Finance:** By a vote of 255 for and 175 against, the House approved a bill to reform congressional campaign financing by putting a voluntary cap on spending and introducing partial public funding. The bill (HR 3) was sent to a House-Senate conference committee.

For House candidates, the bill sets voluntary spending limits of \$600,000 per election cycle. Incumbents and challengers accepting them would get up to \$200,000 in public vouchers for buying television, radio and newspaper advertising, postage and printed material. A later bill would raise the public money.

Regardless of whether they agree to limit spending, House candidates could receive no more than \$200,000 from political action committees (PACs) and up to \$200,000 in individual contributions over \$200.

The bill drew overwhelming support from Democrats, many of

whom like spending limits and want to retain PAC contributions. It was opposed mainly by Republicans, many of whom oppose public financing and want to abolish PAC money from campaigns.

A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Kildee, Levin, Ford. **Voting no:** Knollenberg and Carr.

## SENATE

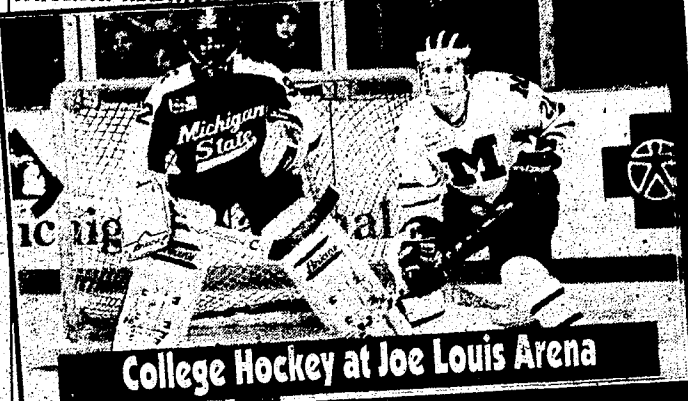
**S&L Bailout:** By a vote of 54 for and 45 against, the Senate approved a bill (S 714) providing the Resolution Trust Corp. with \$18.3 billion to cover depositor losses incurred during the collapse of hundreds of savings-and-loans in the 1980s. The bill, which is expected to complete the S&L bailout at a total cost of about \$105 billion in appropriations, was sent to the House (above).

Supporter Don Riegle, D-Mich., said: "It is important to remember that the purpose of this legislation is to protect depositors at failed thrifts. That is where all the money goes — to depositors."

Opponent John Kerry, D-Mass., complained that "a number of private law firms, accounting firms and real estate contractors have taken advantage of RTC's management weaknesses to rip off the public, increasing the overall cost of the S&L bailout."

A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Michigan Senators, both Democrats, Carl Levin and Donald Riegle voted yes.**

### '93 trends, memories are food for thought

**D**epending on which side of the fence you were sitting on, 1993 was the "year of opposites" for foodies. Vegetarians claim an 8-10 percent increase while the beef industry claims to be enjoying a renaissance.

Bistro fare again tops the charts, and while the folks at "Bon Appetit" magazine claim the French top the bistro trend in 1993, my desk is littered with Trattoria cookbooks from Italy.

The trend toward comfort food has opened a door to a new cuisine dubbed "country American." Momma's chicken casserole of the 1960s is now trendily being monickered as "chicken fried steak." Plain old mashed potatoes have fallen from grace. To be in tune with the 1990s, you have to add roasted garlic and a touch of dill. It's actually easier to find jicama at the vegetable market than it is to find arutabaga.

Thank goodness all those trendy greens have wilted into oblivion not just because they were so expensive and tasted about as exciting as they sounded (i.e. mache), but how many folks do you know who could actually discern the arugula from the frisee?

#### Memories

Looking back at 1993 brought fond memories of food. Remember my trip to New Orleans and the subsequent column on those crazy Cajuns and their desire to eat crayfish for breakfast, lunch and dinner? You told me in no uncertain terms that my tastes could be shoved where the sun didn't shine.

For really trendy foodstuffs you can spend a paycheck at any of the Merchant of Vino stores and not even venture near the beer and wine. When it comes to bakeries and bread you can't hold a candle to the folks at the Little Prince in Birmingham (their croissants are to die for!), the baguettes at Baking by the Avers in Southfield, the bagels from the Detroit Bagel Factory, especially when they're hot from the oven, and the cheesy-whole wheat bread my Panasonic Bread Maker churns out on demand. Warning, if you're contemplating the purchase of a bread maker you better invest in a treadmill too! Technology has made it just too darn easy, and too darn good!

Last, but certainly not least, when it comes to keeping my kitchen up to par with all the necessary equipment, tools, gadgets and cookware, the folks at Williams-Sonoma and Crate and Barrel have the West Coast trends locked up, but when it comes to the best stocked, most knowledgeable you-name-it-and-they-have-it-kind-of-a-store, the folks at Kitchen Glamour should take a well deserved bow. 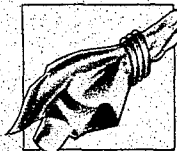

## Busy mom likes quick, one-pot meals

Between work, shopping for gifts and visiting with friends and family, it is a wonder that anyone eats properly at all during the holiday season. Lisa Rice of Bloomfield seems to have everything under control, which is incredible since she gave birth to her second child in October.

Lisa's biggest problem is trying to prepare something quick for her 2-year-old son Andrew.

She wanted something she could throw in a pot, and not have to worry too much about like her clam chowder.

Since it is a one pot recipe, she really likes it, but is concerned about all the fat. Our make over reduced the amount of fat from a whopping 16.4 grams of fat per serving to a much more reasonable 1.0 grams of fat per serving.

Chef Boyardee has some great canned macaroni and cheese. It has only four grams of fat per 15-ounce can, and is very cheesy. I take it for lunch when I don't have time to cook. It's also great for camping trips. Chef Boyardee also has cheese tortellini in a can. This is also wonderful because it has only two grams of fat per 15-ounce can.

Lois Hausman of Bloomfield Hills wanted to know where she could purchase the Pillsbury instant powdered gravy mix mentioned in the November column. I have always found it at Meijer's. It is usually right next to the section that has all the powdered gravy and sauce mixes. Look for a small white box.

If you can't find it, try the bottled gravy by Pillsbury. It contains zero grams of fat per two ounces of brown gravy, and one gram of fat per two ounces for the chicken flavor. It is the same gravy, it just has the water already added.

shows throughout the New Year's Brunch Menu she planned.

Cohen recommends setting up a basic fruit juice and coffee bar for guests to help themselves. A crustless quiche made with cheese and served with Brazilian Peppers Sauce can be made in advance and reheated just before serving.

She suggests accompanying the quiche with a platter of Scottish smoked salmon and party pumpernickel bread which requires no work at all other than selecting the finest smoked salmon you can find. Fill a basket with raisin scones you make at home or buy at a good local bakery or gourmet shop.

To complete the meal, add an orange compote made with peeled and sliced oranges, sugar and white wine (which needs to be made at least four hours in advance) and a basket filled with mixed grapes.

With a menu as simple as the one which Annabel Cohen designed, the host can really relax and spend time with guests. If you want to enhance the menu with an additional dessert, you may wish to ask one of the guests to bring something.

"Bringing a dessert is easier for a guest to bring to a party than an entree which requires more preparation," said Cohen.

In searching for appropriate, easy, do-ahead recipes, Cohen believes that you are only limited by your own imagination.

For example, if a recipe calls for a flavor that you don't like such as dill, substitute an herb that you do like such as basil. Recipes are guidelines to follow, and your substitutions will make it special.

"I always like to assemble a simple classic brunch menu with muffins, waffles or French toast especially during the holidays," said Greg Ervin, Executive chef at Sebastian's restaurant in Troy's Somerset Collection. After a busy season filled with lots of cooking and baking, it's OK for home cooks to take some shortcuts. "There are a few waffle and muffin mixes in the gourmet shops which are very good," said Ervin. He also recommends planning as many do-ahead dishes as possible.

"Especially during the holidays, try to incorporate some of the leftovers from the night before into a recipe such as chopping some of the ham and incorporating it into an omelet or quiche," he said.

When preparing waffles or pancakes, chef Ervin recommends mixing and refrigerating the batter for about 24 hours before grilling. He says they'll rise much better if you do.

Corn muffins with little bits of fresh, cooked bacon are currently a popular combination at the restaurant. For another variation, he suggests adding a few teaspoons of fruit preserves to a well sprayed muffin tin before adding the batter. When the muffins are

flipped out of the tins they'll have a glistening fruit topping.

To insure that professional look, fill muffin tins to the rim with batter. "And always set the muffin tins in the center of the oven, to allow the heat to circulate," he added. For a little variation add a few chopped nuts, a little bran or some berries to your favorite basic recipe.

If you want to convert your favorite basic muffin recipe to a bran muffin recipe, the Kretschmer wheat germ folks recommend substituting 1/4 cup of wheat germ for 1/2 cup of all-purpose flour. Substitute 1/4 cup fat-free egg substitute or two egg whites for one whole egg, use skim milk and substitute low-fat or fat-free plain yogurt for sour cream.

To accompany the muffins or waffles, chef Ervin like to blend some pure maple syrup with softened cream cheese. "It's a great accompaniment and can be done the day before," he said. If you'll be blending this mixture with an electric mixer, use the flat beater, and not the whisk because it will easily become overwhipped.

Mike Thibault one of four partners at The Cook's Garden in Birmingham which opened in October, likes to create a brunch menu that works equally well for a light luncheon.

One of his favorite dishes is a sandwich made on grilled homemade grain or semolina bread, with smoked turkey or a

smoked turkey Reuben.

"I like to recommend serving lots of fruits and vegetables to clients planning a brunch menu. I especially like to accompany vegetable trays with a dip made with a base of boursin cheese," said Thibault. Serving finger foods at brunch is also highly recommended because it gives guests lots of variety.

Currently, fingers of toasted bread dipped into a thin peanut butter coating and then rolled in toasted crumbs mixed with a few pieces of finely crumbled bacon are a popular item.

When setting up a buffet table, don't set out too much food at once. "As long as everything has been prepared in advance, it's best to keep refreshing the trays and chafing dishes periodically because much of it will dry out after a few hours," said Thibault.

No matter how you choose to celebrate the first day of the year whether you're cooking from scratch, incorporating a side dish or two to be made from a mix or allowing a professional caterer to create the entire meal, keep it simple and enjoy the day.

## Rack of lamb elegant dinner

The menu has been set for the Janes Gang New Years Eve Feast. Here's what's gracing our table to herald in the start of 1994.

### HONEY MUSTARD AND PECAN ROASTED RACK OF LAMB

- 1/4 cup Dijon mustard
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 tablespoon molasses
- 2 small cloves garlic, chopped fine
- 1/2 cup pecans, toasted and chopped
- 3 tablespoons fresh bread crumbs
- 1 teaspoon fresh rosemary, minced or 1/2 teaspoon dried, crumbled
- 2 tablespoons olive oil

1 to 1 1/2 pound racks of lamb

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Combine mustard with honey, molasses and garlic. Mix well, and set aside. Combine pecans, bread crumbs and rosemary in a blender or food processor until mixture resembles a fine meal.

Heat olive oil in a large skillet over high heat. Add one rack of lamb and brown on all sides, turning frequently, until golden, about 5 minutes.

Transfer to roasting pan. Repeat with remaining rack of lamb. Pat lamb dry. Spread mustard mixture all over the lamb. Sprinkle half the nut mixture over each rack. Roast until meat thermometer inserted in the center reaches 130-135 degrees for medium rare.

Cut racks into chops. Transfer to plates and serve. Serves 4.

### CRUSTLESS QUICHE WITH BRAZILIAN PEPPERS SAUCE

- 1 stick butter, melted (8 tablespoons)
- 8 slices egg bread or challah, crusts removed
- 2 cups milk
- 4 eggs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 pound soft cheese, grated (Havarti, Brie, or Camembert or a combination)
- 1 cup chopped red or green pepper

The day before: Heat oven to 350 degrees. Butter a casserole or 2-quart souffle dish. Brush butter on one side of the bread slices. Combine milk, eggs, salt and pepper and mix well.

Arrange half the bread in the casserole. Sprinkle with half the red pepper and cheese. Repeat. Pour milk-egg mixture slowly over the bread. Let stand for 15-20 minutes. Bake 15-20 minutes until the cheese is melted. Remove from oven, cool and refrigerate until the next day.

The next day: Heat oven to 350 degrees. Place quiche in oven and bake for 30 minutes or until the top has puffed and is golden.

### BRAZILIAN PEPPERS SAUCE

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 large Spanish onion, peeled and sliced
- 1 sweet red pepper, cut into strips
- 1 green pepper, cut into strips
- 1 yellow pepper, cut into strips
- 2 large tomatoes, sliced
- 1/2 cup tomato sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- Dash of Tabasco sauce

Heat olive oil in large saucepan. Add onion and cook for 3 minutes. Add peppers and cook 3 minutes more. Add tomatoes, tomato sauce and seasonings and cook for 15 minutes more, stirring every few minutes. Serve as a side sauce for the quiche. May be made up to 3 days in advance.

### LARANJAS MARQUESAS

- 8 oranges, peeled and sliced
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup white wine

Place sliced orange in a glass dish. Sprinkle sugar over the oranges. Heat white wine and vanilla and boil for 3 minutes. Pour the hot liquid over the oranges and let sit 4 hours or more.

### GINGER ORANGE MUFFINS

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup wheat germ, any flavor
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1/2 cup finely chopped crystallized ginger, divided
- 3/4 cup orange juice
- 1/4 cup margarine, melted
- 2 egg whites, slightly beaten

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Line 12 medium muffin cups with paper baking cups or spray bottoms only with no-stick cooking spray. Combine flour, wheat germ, brown sugar, baking powder, spices and salt.

Stir in 1/4 cup crystallized ginger, reserving remainder. Add combined orange juice, margarine and egg whites; mix just until dry ingredients are moistened. Fill muffin cups 3/4 full.

Sprinkle with remaining crystallized ginger and additional wheat germ, if desired. Bake 18 to 20 minutes or until golden brown.

In medium saucepan, combine cider and cherries. Place over medium heat and stir occasionally until mixture comes to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer 20 minutes.

Combine cinnamon and sugar in a small bowl, mix well. Wet rims of six tall stemmed clear wine glasses, dip into cinnamon and sugar. Set aside glasses. Pour hot cider and cherry mixture into blender, blend for 60 seconds. Pour into prepared

glasses. Serves 6.

# Cook, serve eggs in just one dish

AP — Conventional cooking is just as fast as scrambling eggs in the microwave oven. However, the microwave oven has a decided advantage over the stove-top method. You need just one dish for both cooking and serving. And cleanup is easy because eggs don't stick to the dish the way they usually do.

## CHEDDAR SCRAMBLED EGGS WITH APPLE

- 1 small apple, cored and chopped (¾ cup)
- 2 green onions, thinly sliced (2 tablespoons)
- 1 tablespoon margarine or butter
- 6 eggs
- ¼ cup milk
- ¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 cup cubed fully cooked ham
- 3-ounce package cream cheese, cubed
- ¼ of a 4-ounce package of Cheddar Cheese

In a 1½-quart microwave-safe casserole, combine chopped apple, green onions and margarine or butter. Cook, uncovered, on 100 percent power (high) for 2 to 3 minutes or until just tender.

Meanwhile, in a medium mixing bowl combine eggs, milk and nutmeg. Beat with a fork until combined. Stir in ham and cream cheese. Stir into apple mixture in casserole.

Cook, uncovered, on high for 1½ minutes. Push cooked portions to the center of the dish. Cook, uncovered, on high for 2½ to 3 minutes more or until eggs are almost set, pushing cooked portions to the center after every 30 seconds. Sprinkle with Cheddar cheese. Serve at once. Makes 3 servings.

## QUICK CARAMEL-PECAN ROLLS

- 3 tablespoons margarine or butter
- ¼ cup packed brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon light corn syrup
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ¼ cup chopped pecans, peanuts, or walnuts
- 1 package (6) refrigerated biscuits

In a 1-cup glass measure cook margarine or butter, uncovered, on 100 percent power (high) for 40 to 50 seconds or until melted. Stir in brown sugar, corn syrup and cinnamon. Cook, uncovered, on high for 30 to 40 seconds or until sugar is dissolved.

Spoon the sugar mixture into a microwave-safe muffin pan or six 6-ounce custard cups lined with paper baking cups. Sprinkle chopped nuts atop. Place 1 biscuit over nuts in each cup. For custard cups, arrange on a microwave-safe plate, leaving center open.

Cook, uncovered, on high 1 to 1½ minutes or until done, giving the pan or plate a half-turn after 30 seconds. Let stand for 1 minute. Invert onto a plate. Serve warm. Makes 6 rolls.

## THE PLOT THICKENS

Vitamin C actually enhances the absorption of iron and manganese. Copper and zinc, however, frustrate the absorption of one another. Therefore, it is important to carefully plot the intake of supplements so that they act in a complementary manner. There should be little problem when taking multivitamins with no more than 100 percent of the recommended daily allowance (RDA). Taking high doses of specific supplements, though, can be a different story. For example, taking calcium, iron, or zinc at only twice the RDA's recommended dosage can alter the absorption of other nutrients. Be sure to check a nutrient's blocking or enhancing effect when taking high doses.

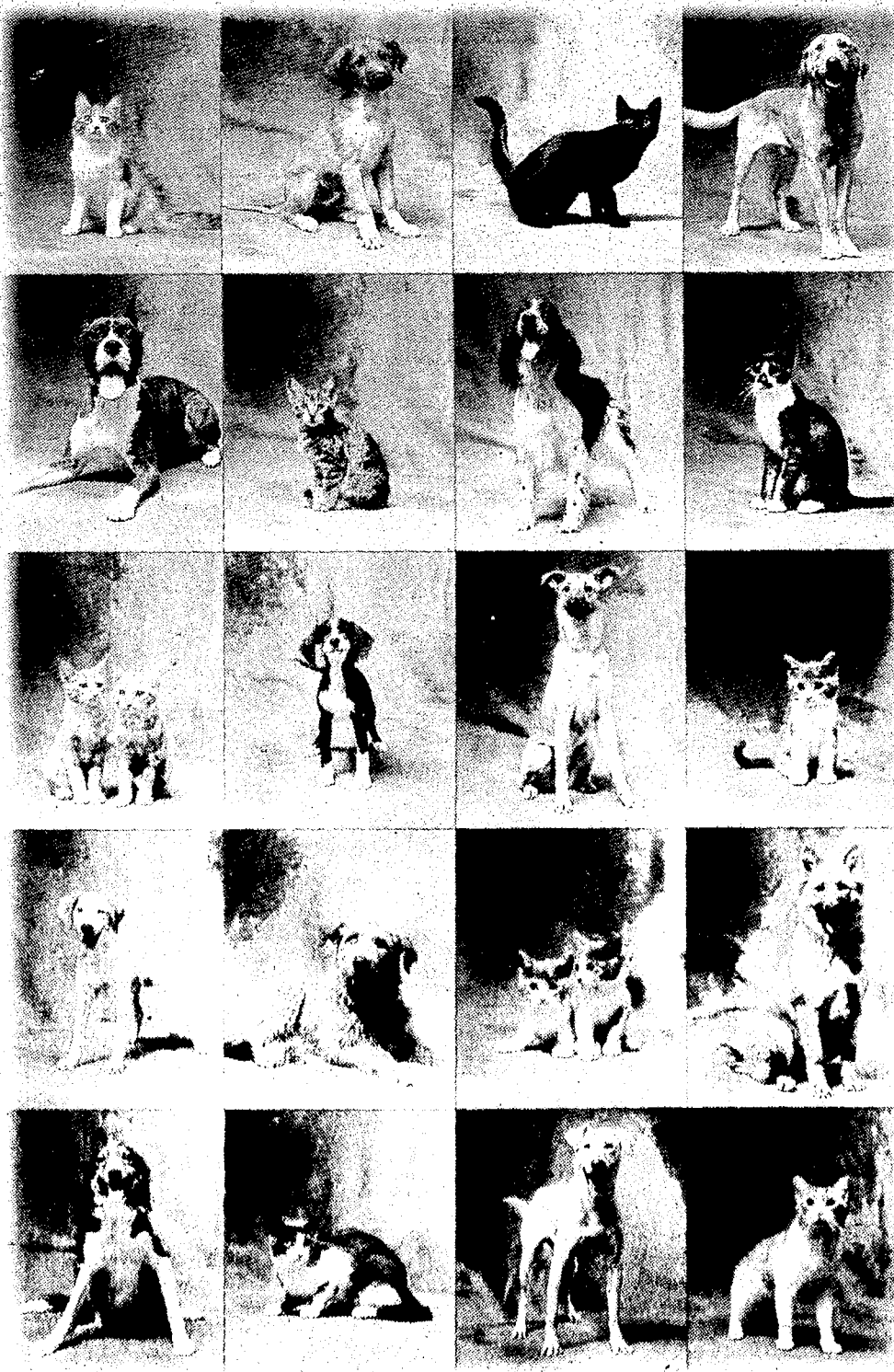

## Big Wheeler's Bone Orchard — Big Wheeler



The senior citizens of the blues community have been getting some long overdue recognition over the past few years and I'm the first to stand up and say that it's only fitting and proper. Not all of the accolades are deserved, though. Longevity hardly equals proficiency in any field of endeavor.

Sixty-four-year-old Golden "Big" Wheeler is one of those elder statesmen who deserves the attention. He first hit Chicago and worked his way into the busiest musical landscape out there, in the mid-1940s. As soon as the reality of just how intense the competition was and how much a family required to keep it afloat, he dropped back out of music for almost 35 years and took a day job.

Now that Big Wheeler is in retirement, the music finally gets back to the front seat, and one can only wonder at how good it might have been to him had he stayed with it all along. All of which, perhaps, sounds like preface to why the "old man" should have kept his day job, but I'm here to tell you that the man's got something to say and a wholly infectious means of doing so.

Certainly, Little Walter's close friend isn't in the same category in the chops shop, but he and Smokey Smothers' old band, the Ice Cream Men, are earnest about keeping the flame of classic Chicago blues burning bright. So, it isn't the tightest or rockiest disc you'll hear this year. It stands up to anything out there for sheer heart and joy in the playing.

Wheeler is still a pretty formidable harmonica blowing vocalist, and the band cuts a tight groove behind him throughout. Outside of Jimmy Reed's "Down in Virginia" and Little Walter's "Everybody Needs Somebody," the program leans on drummer Steve Cushing originals and less familiar cuts from the blues history book.

If "Evil Woman" doesn't blow your hair back, I guess we're doomed to different strokes.

# Detroit rocks in the New Year



There'll be plenty of will be rockin'n'rollin' in Detroit this New Year's Eve with performances by the likes of Goobar & The Peas, Clutch, Karen Monster and Ted Nugent giving metro music fans plenty of choices.

One year Ted Nugent opened his annual "Whiplash Bash" by playing guitar while dangling upside down from a rope. Another time, he drove his Ford Bronco onto the stage.

For this New Year's Eve show at Cobo Arena in Detroit (810-645-6666) he's close-mouthed about what kind of hijinks he's going to pull, so let's just say it's going to be a trademark Ted free-for-all.

"It's the consummate rock'n'roll, energized event in the history of the planet," Nugent said via telephone from the office of his magazine, "World Bowhunters." "It's virtually unparalleled. It has this certain atmosphere. You have to see it in order to comprehend the dynamics of it."

New Year's Eve is the beginning of a busy new year for Nugent who will play only solo material at the Cobo show. He's working on a new album and will debut his nationally syndicated radio show in spring. He said his radio show will resemble his guest DJ stints.

"If you've heard me on the radio, you know I just whip out anything — new stuff, old stuff, different stuff," he said.

### Cry Wolf

Ex-J. Geils singer Peter Wolf will be kicking out material representing his entire career at The Ritz in Roseville (778-6404) on New Year's Eve. The quintessential rhythm and blues rocker is bringing along his

new band, The Incomparable Houseparty 5. Although he was offered a few other gigs on New Year's Eve, Wolf felt the obvious choice was to play in Detroit — a town he often refers to as his second home. He likes the honesty that Detroit fans emit.

"Well, it's just that they let you know what they like. If they like it, they let you know," Wolf said.

He hopes the Detroit audiences will approve of his new band. Although it has a few of the same traits as J. Geils, it's not a clone, he said.

## STREET BEATS

"It's like being in love but with a different boyfriend; it's a different person with different actions and reactions."

His next album, to be released in March, will reflect that.

"It's a collection of primal, intimate songs that are more biographical," he said.

### In a Clutch

The Baltimore, Md., alternative rock band Clutch also calls Detroit its second home.

Within the last year, Clutch has gone from attracting 20 fans to selling out the 1,000-person capacity St. Andrew's Hall. Lead singer Neil Fallon attributes that to the band's one-man Detroit publicity team — former St. Andrew's Hall/Shelter bartender Dan Kotwicki.

"Just out of his own personal interest, he started playing our CD at the bar and he bought all of our records and sold them (at the Shelter) — not for profit" just for exposure, Fallon said.

Clutch's album "Transnational Speedway League: Anthems, Anecdotes and Undeniable Truths" is one that should be exposed to a wider audience. The intense dirgy guitar and Fallon's growling vocals make Henry Rollins look laid back. Clutch, the master of metaphors, often uses humorous lyrics, however, to make their point. For example, in "A Shogun Named Marcus," Fallon sings "I'm like a buzz bomb. So Beebopballoobopawopshambo and domo arigato if I got to."

The lyrics that are considered the humorous ones weren't written with the intent that it was going to be a comedy song," he said. "A lot of the lyrics (in other band's music) are 110 percent anger. That's all well and nice in their own right. (But) you can do other things with loud music."

Because of the lyrics, it makes it easy for Clutch to be mistaken for juvenile, Fallon said.

"The bad ones (reviews) are usually people who don't get it, not to sound pretentious."

### New Recipee

The Junk Monkeys, Tyrone's Powerwheel Chicago's Catherine will perform with Clutch. Below St. Andrew's Hall at The Shelter, Brotherhood Recipee will showcase their new sound and lineup. Former backup singer Aimee Armstrong moved up front to lead vocalist and guitarist John Kinney replaces Chris Conley. That's not all that's new, however, with the former funk/rap band.

"We're more like traditional '70s

funk music. Everyone cites Parliament-Funkadelic as influences. We're more along the lines of Average White Band... Earth, Wind and Fire. That's what we are now — real, clean '70s," said guitarist Perry LaVoisine.

Detroit Music Award winners Charm Farm will play prior to Brotherhood Recipee's set at The Shelter. Admission to The Shelter, St. Andrew's Hall and the Burns Room (techno/house music will be spun there) is \$10. For more information, call 961-MELT.

Earlier in the evening, Brotherhood Recipee will be one of about 14 alternative and country bands playing at the Hyatt Regency Fairlane in Dearborn (810-645-6666). The \$39 ticket price includes food and drink tickets.

# Marr, Morrissey, together again in a book

The Smiths were undoubtedly one of the most influential, infuriating, enigmatic and glorious of the post-punk bands of the 1980s.

Lead vocalist and lyricist Morrissey provided canvas of sardonic, outrageous lyrics while guitarist Johnny Marr's searing, hook-ridden play emblazoned itself onto the subconscious of a generation of music listeners.

The Smiths disbanded in 1988, having produced six studio albums. A

series of best of collections and a live LP have followed in the band's wake.

They went their separate ways: Morrissey a solo career producing uneven results and Marr as a journeyman with a host of bands from the Pretenders to Electronic.

As events would dictate, there's now a book.

"Morrissey & Marr: The Severed Alliance" by Johnny Rogan attempts to be the definitive tome on the creative collaboration that caused equal amounts of delirium among fans and

critics alike.

The unauthorized biography, released stateside by Omnibus Press, precipitated a ruckus upon its release in England. Morrissey, who had not yet read the book, supposedly lodged death threats against its author.

Rogan, who has charted such disparate musical courses as Van Morrison and Wham!, hasn't gone into Sal Rushdie-type seclusion.

"It didn't bother me at all," said Rogan in a telephone interview. "When you've written books about

pop management, a pussycat like Morrissey, there's nothing to be disturbed about."

Rogan interviews family and friends. He chronicles Morrissey's and Marr's respective family genealogies going back to Ireland.

The avid Smiths' denizen may appreciate the black and white family photos and factoids, such as the Morrisseys living in Dublin a few blocks from Christy Brown of "My Left

## 'Ethan Frome': Study in desperation

The works of Edith Wharton have been getting a flurry of new attention recently with the recent release of "The Age of Innocence." Another recent adaptation that received little notice is the 1992 film "Ethan Frome," which true to its source material lacks the opulence of the New York high society tale.

It's unfortunate the film didn't get better exposure because it is a well-crafted tale of loneliness and what some people are willing to do to find love.

Arriving at a new assignment in rural Massachusetts, a young minister meets a severely crippled farmer who appears to be shunned by the townspeople. Not that the impoverished farmer is a friendly sort himself. The minis-

ter is determined to help the farmer Ethan Frome, played by Liam Neeson, and hires him as a driver. Eventually the minister begins piecing together the story of Frome, not directly from the farmer but from a family friend.

Frome was once a strong young man who left the family farm to study electrical engineering in a warmer climate. He returns home to help care for his ill mother but never plans to stay. He wants to sell the farm and head west.

Ethan's distant cousin Zeena, who grew up in another town, came to nurse the sick woman. Played by Joan Allen, Zeena is a classic passive-aggressive type who brings out guilt and nurturing feelings in Ethan. After five years

marriage, Zeena insists on being fussed over due to her health which she complains was broken by nursing Ethan's late mother.

It's a cold relationship set in a very cold climate. Nearly all of the story takes place during varying degrees of winter. At Zeena's insistence, a young relative comes to help around the house, taking over the little cubbyhole Ethan uses for reading and keeping his engineering books. A frail and sickly orphan, Mattie eventually regains her strength and starts to blossom personally, if not becoming especially adept at her household duties.

Played by Patricia Arquette, Mattie is like a ray of sunshine in the Frome house, laughing and singing. Neeson is very good as Ethan, a desperately lonely man overwhelmed by his disappoint-

ing life. He responds to the only warmth that anyone has shown him in years, and Mattie, with no home or family, is drawn to Ethan.

It's to Allen's credit that even Zeena, who could easily be cast as the villain of the work, is neurotic and bitter, but seems like she cares about her husband, even if she can't express it. When Zeena forces the situation by demanding that Mattie be sent away and replaced with a hired girl, the results show that desperate people will take desperate action.

and the attention she gets from men. She said the 30 years before her weight loss were spent in big, ugly, mumus.

Debbie's husband does not share her excitement. He thinks she looks cheap; they separated last week. The host of the show asked, "Wouldn't any man love it if his wife lost 180 pounds? What's wrong with him?"

Debbie agreed, "Why does he feel threatened?" she said. "I don't want to go with another man, I just love them to pay attention to me."

Some years ago another talk show panel, which was discussed in this column, consisted of a group of men who felt betrayed because their beautiful, sexy wives got fat soon after the men married them. The husbands were angry, they blamed their wives. Their wives were angry, too, accusing their husbands of being superficial for not loving them despite their weight gain.

# Art films flourished during 1993

This was far from a red-letter year for Hollywood. With the exception of "Groundhog Day," most of the movies on this year's list of favorites fall into the high-brow independent category. Most played in limited runs at the Detroit Film Theatre or Main or Maple theaters.

**"The Crying Game"** — I caught Neil Jordan's Irish thriller about a month before all the hype, which left me wide open for the gender-bending twist. Stephen Rea is perfect as a reluctant IRA hit man whose friendship with a political prisoner (Forest Whitaker) leads to a bizarre chain of events.

**"The Piano"** — Jane Campion's third feature is a mythical, moving story set in the wilds of New Zealand. Holly Hunter plays a mute woman in an arranged marriage to a man she doesn't love. The only hope comes through her beloved piano, which a neighbor (Harvey Keitel) uses to attract and then seduce her.

**"Brother's Keeper"** — It proves once again that there's nothing more fascinating than a good documentary. The focus is on the Ward boys, four illiterate bachelor brothers working the family farm in upstate New York. When one is charged with killing

another, the community that once shunned them comes to their defense.

**"Bullet in the Head"** — "Hard Target" was a lot of fun, but for a true taste of Hong Kong director John Woo you had catch his masterpiece during a weekend-long run in Ann Arbor. When three friends unite in a search for gold, they end up instead in the hell of war-torn Vietnam. The action scenes are appropriately over-the-top while a scene in a prison camp rivals "The Deer Hunter" for intensity.

**"Groundhog Day"** — I usually hate Bill Murray movies, yet here I was walking out with a wide grin. This feel-good Hollywood comedy, sort of a '90s "It's a Wonderful Life," begins with a clever premise (weatherman relives the same dull day over and over again) and then takes off in unexpected directions.

**"Nashville"** — The re-release of his 1976 masterpiece at the Detroit Film Theatre only solidified Robert Altman's growing reputation. Country music and a presidential election mix in this inspired hodgepodge of solid acting (Keith Carradine and Lily Tomlin, among others) and dizzying directorial style. Altman's over-

rated "Short Cuts" only pales in comparison.

**"Household Saints"** — "True Love" director Nancy Savoca could have found a nice, safe script so she could make a bundle in Hollywood. What does she do instead? She makes a movie about the power of Catholic upbringing in New York's Little Italy. The result was box-office poison, but one of the year's rarest and most uncompromising treats.

**"Much Ado About Nothing"** — Kenneth Branagh proves once again that The Bard is alive and well at your local movie theater. This highly accessible adaptation of a lesser Shakespearean comedy shines in the love-hate relationship between Branagh and real-life wife Emma Thompson. Denzel Washington fares well, Michael Keaton and Keanu Reeves less so in the star-studded supporting cast.

**"The Age of Innocence"** — Shelved for almost a year, Martin Scorsese's detailed portrait of 19th-century New York was worth the wait. Daniel Day-Lewis and Michelle Pfeiffer play unrequited lovers in the faithful rendering of Edith Wharton's novel. Not since Orson Welles' "Magnificent Ambersons" has a great director paid such a stunning (sometimes sarcastic) homage to a time long past.

**"The Snapper"** — First came "The Commitments," about a naive music promoter determined to bring soul to Dublin. This new film, the second in a proposed trip, focuses on basically the same large Irish-Catholic family. More unexpected than the eldest daughter's pregnancy is the clever way the story unfolds. (Although it opened elsewhere in December, we'll see this one locally at the DFT in January.)

**Honorable mention:** "Menace II Society," "In the Line of Fire," "Metropolis," and "Woman in the Moon" (with live musical accompaniment by Drop at the Mag Bag), "Like Water for Chocolate," "Passion Fish," "Farewell My Concubine," "Manhattan Murder Mystery," "Hard Target," "Adams Family Values," "Remains of the Day" and "The Secret Garden."

**Still haven't seen:** "Schindler's List" and "Searching for Bobby Fischer."

**Most significant film event locally:** The opening of the Main Art Theatre in Royal Oak.

right or wrong, it is human nature to feel cheated when a contract is changed after it is signed. If you buy an expensive dress and it falls apart, it is reasonable that you will feel cheated. Debbie's dilemma is an interesting twist on that idea.

In her mind her husband is not being cheated, but getting a better deal than he expected. According to her and to America's cultural standards, she is worth more than she was fat. So her husband's rejection of her seems truly unfair.

It is possible that Debbie's husband left her because he thinks fat women are beautiful and that thin women are not. The old cliché, "beauty is in the eye of the beholder," generally is true.

Another possibility is that he wanted a "safe" wife, one who needed him so badly, she could never leave him. In our culture beautiful women, and often that means thin women, are not as "safe" in a relationship as heavy women because they have more choices.

Debbie's husband may not want a marriage in which he has less power than he did originally. Maybe he married Debbie because, being overweight, he thought she

could not make demands of him, and had to accept the demands that he made on her.

There are other possibilities why Debbie's husband does not want to stay with her. The principle of not changing a bargain midstream holds in most of them. Some men don't want a flashy car; it costs too much. They bought the economy car because that is the one that fits them.

Now the choice is Debbie's. It is obvious that she will not feel good about herself if she gains back 180 pounds. She didn't say whether or not she can make it on her own without her husband. If she can't live without him, she will have to give up her new pride and independence and live by his rules. If she is adequate and can live alone, she gets to keep her pride. Choices have consequences.

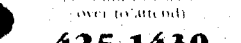

Also featured are set lists from bootlegs of performances (where The Smith's 1986 Detroit appearance is incorrectly referred to as the Fox Theatre in Chicago) in a complete discography as well as videos.

The heart of the book, though, delves into the creative mindset that formed a fragile but prolific musical partnership. And, more importantly, what factors led to its eventual split.

"It was very much a complementary relationship," Rogan said. "Morrissey was effectively bedroom bound when Johnny Marr appeared."

"With Johnny Marr, he was looking for a songwriting partner. He saw something in Morrissey, a good eccentric pop writer and a character as well."

The obsessive, intense character, though, would eventually leave the partnership frayed. Concluded Rogan: "It was endearing in the beginning when you are making it, it can entrench you in various ways down the line."

Other factors contributed to the breakup, according to Rogan. Marr felt constricted by The Smiths' musical direction. He liked dance music; Morrissey did not.

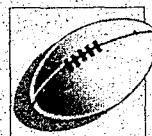

"It was a tough decision," Brzezinski said. "You have to understand that Notre Dame is the best in the country, but I felt more at home at Boston College. I liked the atmosphere and the players at B.C. I met a lot of the faculty people and I had a great time. It's a nice campus."

# Hixon's hard work gets results

The shoe that fits Pierre Hixon best is Reebok.

He certainly knows first-hand from his own personal experience that "Life is Short, Play Hard."

Maybe that's why Hixon, a Wayne Memorial High product, was so driven as he entered his final season as a starting defensive back for Western Michigan University's football team.

"We never had to push Pierre, he did it on his own," WMU defensive coordinator Larry Edlund said. "He's self-motivated, the hardest worker on our football team, bar none. He's just a great leader, but he does it by example. He's always in the front of the line for everything."

The 5-foot-11, 180-pound Hixon was voted first-team All Mid-American Conference, but recently learned of a more prestigious honor.

### UPI All-American

United Press International named him honorable mention All-American.

As a senior, Hixon made 70 tackles, including four for minus yards, and also topped the Broncos in pass deflections (10) and interceptions (5). Western, which ranked second nationally in pass defense, finished the year 7-3-1 overall and 6-1-1 in the MAC.

Hixon also ranks ninth all-time on the school list in interceptions (10). He tied a school record for deflections in one game (4).

Taking a cue from fellow Western DB Paul Davis, Hixon stuck around Kalamazoo during the summer for

the first time and put himself through a rigorous regimen.

The decision paid dividends in more ways than one.

### Summer dividends

"I saw the improvement Paul made when he came in for his senior year," Hixon recalled. "For me to be better, I had to do the same thing."

After taking classes in the spring, Hixon worked seven days, 54 hours per week doing physical labor in two different warehouses.

"But that was only part of his day."

"The strength coach had some nice workouts," Hixon said. "And I usually ran until I puked. It was day-in and day-out. I didn't miss any workouts. I had only three days vacations."

Hixon was able to drop his 40-yard dash time to 4.46.

"He got his 40 time down on his own effort," Edlund said. "He was totally dedicated this year. He also spent a lot of time at night studying films."

Midway through the season, Hixon strained a ligament in his knee, forcing him to miss the Eastern Michigan game.

### Big game at Army

Although still hampered by the injury, Hixon played through the pain the next week in a memorable victory at Army.

He enjoyed his best game of his career, making seven tackles to go along with an interception and a forced fumble. Hixon was honored as MAC Player of the Week.

## Lake Shore whips Shamrocks

The Shorians, led by Michigan signee Travis Conlan's game-high 27 points, proved to be adept pickpockets, robbing the Shamrocks blind in a 60-48 victory.

CC, which slipped to 2-2 overall, committed 24 turnovers, 17 in the first half alone. Needless to say, Lake Shore's suffocating and pressure defense also had something to do with CC shooting a paltry 33 percent from the floor (18 of 54).

"We sell our team on defense," said Lake Shore coach Greg Esler, whose team is 4-0 overall. "We've been giving up less than 46 points per game. Tonight we had to make it a game between the hash marks, 28 feet and out. We tried to make them beat us by bringing it down the court because they (CC) are good in the post."

The cat-quick Conlan, a 6-foot-3 senior point-guard with deft ball-handling and passing skills, drove the Shamrocks nuts with his penetration moves to the basket.

"You try and double team him, but then he can read the split instantly," said CC coach Bernie Holowicki, whose career win total remained on hold at 597. "We had a defensive scheme, but you never knew it. He (Conlan) would read it, give it up and get the ball back in his hands."

CC stayed close for most of three quarters before Lake Shore went on a 8-0 run.

Two straight dribble-drive layups by Conlan at 6:01 and 4:55 of the final period gave the Shorians a 51-36 advantage.

CC would never recover.

"Travis has great vision of the floor," Esler said. "And he's so hard to guard. We wanted him to take the ball to the basket because they crowded him out top. When he goes to the basket, good things happen. Michigan got a great one in him. I think he's the best point-guard in the state."

Carlo Sesta and Jeff Pouttu contributed 11 and nine points, respectively, for the Shorians, who finished 26-1 a year ago before being bounced by eventual

state Class B champion Saginaw Buena Vista in the state semifinals.

Joe Daly, a 6-7 center, paced CC with 18 points. Sean Gallagher chipped in with 12.

But the Shamrocks' Andy Slankster and Andy Kummer, two of the team's top three scorers, combined for only 13 points (on four of 22 shooting).

"We didn't play smart," Holowicki said. "They changed defenses, and we didn't do a good job of recognizing that."

"Our individual defense was OK, but our team defense did not play well. Our help defense on Number 21 (Conlan) was nonexistent."

Holowicki's team is off for the holidays before resuming their schedule Tuesday, Jan. 4, at Redford Bishop Borgess in the Catholic League Central Division opener.

"Our first game back is with Borgess and they're a more talented team than they (Lake Shore) are," Holowicki said. "We have to improve on bringing the ball down the court and setting a tone. We have to play more disciplined. Tonight they (Lake Shore) dictated the tempo."

"I was brought up to work hard," Hixon said. "I learned that from the coaches at Wayne. You don't let anybody go ahead of you. Anyway, somebody has to be at the front of the line, so why not me?"

Hixon was a standout in football, basketball and track during his days at Wayne.

But things always didn't come easy.

His father, Anthony, died during his junior year.

## Remembering his father

"He taught me everything I know," Pierre said. "And I wanted to make sure everything he taught me was not a waste of time."

"It gave me a more serious outlook on life. It taught me that you can't take people or relationships for granted because you never know when they'll be gone."

Wayne basketball coach Chuck Henry, who is close to his former player, went through a similar experience.

"My dad died when I was a sophomore in high school, and I could certainly identify with the

pain and the shock because I went through it," Henry said. "But Pierre took adversity by the throat and grew from it. He was always mature for his age."

"And he truly gave everything he had in every athletic situation. He's certainly one of my favorite kids of all time. He could care less if he scored zero points, as long as the team won. He's a rare breed of athletes."

## Planning for future

Hixon, majoring in criminal justice and sociology, is scheduled to graduate next spring.

Meanwhile, he has aspirations of getting a professional tryout, either in the CFL or the NFL. His motivation is to give his mother Brenda, two sisters and a half-brother a better life.

"We live in Taylor," Hixon said. "We're not totally poor, but we could do a lot better... if you know what I mean. I want my mother to live in a better place some day."

Western teammate Steve Hawkins, a 6-foot-5, 208-pound DB, got the call while Hixon was passed over by pro scouts for

post-season college all-star games.

But Hixon hopes being named honorable mention All-American will open some doors. WMU offensive line coach Bill Bye has been contacting pro scouts on Hixon's behalf.

## Wants shot at pros

"You might see me on tape and say I'm average because of my size and the way I run," Hixon said. "But you'll never know if I'm better until you give me a shot. That's all I'm asking for."

Hixon, however, does have some regrets about his college football career.

"I wish I had been red-shirted as a freshman," he said. "I played special teams all year and was the nickel-back the first half of the season. I was one of those hard-headed guys who thought 'I was the man' because I was playing as a freshman."

"And by not staying every summer on campus and working out the first three years, I kind of sold myself short. I worked out at home, but it's better when you have competition and you're get-

ting pushed by other people like I did last summer."

Hixon's efforts the past four years, however, will not go unnoticed.

"He's a quality kid," Edlund said. "He'll smile and laugh, yet he's not real outgoing. He's a common type guy. He's the type of kid you'd like to have as your son."

A late bloomer who never played football before his freshman year in high school, Brzezinski helped lead the Shamrocks to an 8-1 record this season. He had 39 tackles and three sacks.

CC coach Tom Mach said Brzezinski "may be overall our best 48-minute lineman ever."

Kallas, meanwhile, canceled potential visits to Michigan State, Louisville, USC, Colorado and Bowling Green after making an official trip the weekend of Dec. 3 to Iowa.

"I was impressed with their new facilities, the indoor training center and weight room," Kallas said. "They also have a brand-new business building, and that was a nice factor."

Kallas, who had 39 tackles this year, including seven solos and

three sacks, could find a home quickly, however, in Iowa City.

Sophomore guard Angie Cerne (Allen Park) made two three-point shots and finished with 22 points, including 13 in the first half, to lead the Ocelots.

Sophomore forward Alisa Wechter (New Boston Huron) scored the first six points of the game and was six-of-eight from the field to finish with 12 points.

Freshman forward Julie Klos (Dearborn Fordson) also had 12 points and freshman center Tricia Kazyska (Warren Woods) contributed 11 points.

SC led 44-25 at halftime and limited Delta to seven field goals in the second half.

"The big difference was we fast broke and played defense," Grenan said. "We've been working on our post game the last month and with Klos, Wechter and Kazyska combining for 35 points, it looks like we're learning. With 10 freshmen, we have to learn how to play and then learn how to win."

## SC men lose

The SC men's team played without second-leading scorer Steve Whitlow and lost to first-place Delta, 93-78.

The Ocelots head into the Christmas break at 5-8 overall, 0-4 in the Eastern Conference.

Whitlow, a sophomore guard-forward from Redford Catholic Central, missed the game with a bruised foot. Whitlow, who also saw limited action in a 123-78 loss five days earlier at Highland Park, is expected back for the Jan. 5 game at home against Mott.

Whitlow is averaging 17 points, seven assists, four rebounds and four steals, according to coach Dave Bogataj. "He could barely stand on his

foot," Bogataj said. "You can't tape it, can't pad it, he's just got to stay off it."

Bogataj joked that playing without Whitlow was like "going to the show by yourself," but the Ocelots still provided some drama behind the play of Todd McNeil, a 6-7 sophomore center from Madison Heights Bishop Foley.

McNeil scored a season high 32 points, including 18 in the first half, and also led the Ocelots with 11 rebounds. Freshman forward Abu Hamilton (Romulus) added 17 points.

SC trailed 48-35 at halftime and trailed by nine a couple times in the second half but could never get closer.

"The kids scrapped and played real hard but we could never get over the barrel," Bogataj said.

Bogataj will spend the next week wondering if all his players will return or if some are declared academically ineligible. The Ocelots traditionally lose several players to academics at the semester break.

Bogataj, who said he lost six to academics last year, isn't making any predictions.

"Whatever happens, happens," Bogataj said.

## Vellucci changes disposition on ice

The problem is, Mama Vellucci didn't raise no goon.

"I always told him to be kind and careful," Judy Vellucci said. "What a fool I was, huh?"

Not really. Her son, Mark, is kind, considerate, warm, friendly — all things a mother would want her son to be.

But Mark Vellucci is 6-5, weighs 245 pounds and aspires to play hockey in the NHL. His coaches don't want him to be kind and considerate on the ice.

"With his size, he's always going to be a prospect," said former NHLer Lou Franceschetti, Vellucci's coach and general manager of the Detroit Falcons in the Colonial Hockey League. "He needs to step up his aggressiveness and really put the fear in the other players. He needs to take the body on a more consistent basis."

He needs, in short, a personality adjustment.

"With my size, they expect physical play from me," said the 21-year-old Vellucci, who graduated from Farmington High School in 1990. "They don't really want me to be a goon, but they want me to be there when the rough stuff starts."

"But I've never played that way before. When I played juniors for Compuware, we weren't allowed to fight. You'd get suspended. It's a style I have to adjust to."

The other thing working against him is that, with his size, players aren't exactly lining up to fight him.

"The players see me on the ice, and they just assume I'm some kind of psycho," he said. "They give me a lot of space. It's kind of hard to mix it up when people are running away from me."

The few times he did drop the gloves, he's handled himself quite well. In his first game with the Falcons, he took on Brantford's Jason Taylor, a guy who was kicked out of the East Coast league for excessive fighting, and by all accounts whipped him.

Later he fared well against St. Thomas' Darren Miclak, one of the league's toughest and now a member of the Falcons.

"I think those fights showed them I could do some stuff," Vellucci said.

Franceschetti agrees.

"I think he's still a long ways from where he'd like to be," he said. "This is a big year for him as far as the transition goes. He needs to put himself in a position where he can do big things here next year."

## The long journey

Before talking about where Vellucci's hockey career might be going, it's pertinent to look back on where it's been.

As late as last summer, it looked like his dreams of playing professional hockey were over. It looked like his legacy to hockey would be as the brother of Mike Vellucci (who played four games with the Hartford Whalers in the 1988-89 season and is now rink manager at Compuware's Oak Park Arena) and as the guy who Eric Lindros lived with in 1990 and 1991 when they both played for Compuware.

"I looked into playing Division III college hockey in New York and took all the tests, but it fell through because of money," Vellucci said. "I figured it was time to hang up the skates."

That would have been a premature conclusion to a career that had the P-word written on it from the time he was 10 years old — the word that Vellucci despises more than any other: Potential.

"I can remember one day, Mark was 10," Judy Vellucci said. "He came home and said, 'Mom, if I hear the word potential one more time I'm going to go nuts. Everybody talked about his potential and I think he saw that as pressure.'"

Because of his size, athletics came easily to Vellucci. He was one of those kids who was proficient at everything he tried. He played golf only a few rounds before he scored his first hole-in-one. He decided to give tennis a try in high school and wound up as one of the top players in the district in his first season.

"Because everything came so naturally, he never had to really work at anything," Judy said. "He

never realized the sacrifices it entails to really make it big."

That changed when he played Tier II Juniors with Compuware. Playing with future NHLers like Lindros and Pat Peake, Vellucci was no longer the dominant man on the team.

Those were some great teams, from 1988-89 through 1991-92. Compuware won its league all three years, was 64-0-3 in 1989 before losing in the nationals, and was second in the nation in 1991-92.

"Playing with those guys and at that level, I know I can play the game," Vellucci said. "I know how to play. And being with Eric (Lindros) and watching how hard he worked and how much discipline he had, I learned from that."

## To the Falcons

It was big brother Mike Vellucci who tossed a life raft to Mark's career. Mike finished his professional career with the Falcons in the CoHL, a minor league similar to Double-A baseball, helping them win the title in 1991-92. He arranged a tryout for Mark.

Mark showed enough to warrant a contract, but didn't really secure a spot until the first week of the season. Because of a mix-up with immigration papers, seven Falcons weren't allowed re-entry into the United States after a series of games in Canada. Vellucci was forced into the lineup and showed he belonged.

"I look at this as my big break," Vellucci said. "I have to take advantage of this now. If I don't show something now, it's over."

He's shown both a scoring touch (three goals in just 18 shots) and some punch. But he's shown it in limited bursts and lately his ice time has dwindled.

"He's having trouble adjusting to the speed of the professional game," Franceschetti said. "The time he's missed has hurt him. But, he's fought some tough kids, and he gets his space on the ice. He needs to keep working."

Vellucci came to camp at close to 260 pounds. He's now down to 245 and figures he'll reach his goal of 230 soon. He's eliminated fast foods from his diet. He stays after practice to work out with the club's trainer. In short, he's getting serious.

## Novi rallies to edge Raiders, 62-55

Novi limited the North Farmington boys basketball team to one field goal in the fourth quarter Tuesday and rallied for a 62-55 victory in a first-round game at the Northville Christmas Tournament.

North, which led 45-39 after three quarters, made only one-of-eight shots and missed four front ends of one-and-one free throw attempts in the fourth quarter. Novi outscored North, 13-3.

North enjoyed a 31-20 rebounding advantage for the game but the Wildcats were able to rally in the fourth quarter when each team grabbed 10 rebounds.

"They play real hard and have a good ballclub that's well coached," North coach Tom Negoshian said. "We missed some shots and they made some. But I'm very happy with our effort and I'm not going to fault anyone."

The Raiders were led by Evan Ellis and John Pennala with 14 points each.

North made only 18-34 free throw attempts and Novi was 15-18.

Senior center Scot Lord led North with nine rebounds, Ellis had eight and Tom May seven points and seven rebounds.

Novi senior guard Brian Pierman, who scored a game-high 27 points on nine-of-15 shooting, tied the score at 52 on a three-point shot with about 2:00 left.

Pennala split two free throws to make the score 53-52 but Novi went ahead for good, 54-53, on a baseline jump shot by Shawn Kelly with just less than a minute left.

Pierman stole a North inbound pass and scored on a layup to put Novi up 56-53 and the Wildcats made six straight free throws to seal the win.

The comeback was even more impressive since it was done after Novi's leading rebounder, senior center Rocky Dunlap, left the game in the first two minutes with an ankle injury. Junior captain Jason Fannon played strong defense on Pennala and Jon Wroe scored 11 points off the bench.

Novi first-year coach Pat Schluter got the job last summer when Bob Shoemaker was let go and the Wildcats have made great progress.

"We're playing hard, I'll tell you that," said Schluter, who played four years at Saginaw Valley State. "After Rocky went down, everyone stepped up. We had some trouble early and weren't boxing out on rebounds. I told them we had to put better

pressure on the ball and that's what we did in the fourth quarter."

"We worked a lot on conditioning in the summer and started believing defense will win games."

Negoshian said he was not pleased with an official's call, with North ahead 47-39, early in the fourth quarter that helped give the momentum to Novi. Ellis apparently scored on a rebound basket and was fouled but the referee ruled Ellis was fouled before the shot so the basket was called off.

Ellis missed the ensuing one-and-one attempt and Novi scored the next six points to pull within 47-45.

North led 17-14 after one quarter and used a 9-2 run in the second quarter to go ahead 34-27 at halftime. The Raiders made 11-21 shots in the first half before slumping to 5-21 in the second half to finish at 38 percent (16-42).
